	Spelling Rule	Example word	Example word	Example word
Week 1	<p>cian, -ssion</p> <p>The 'shun' sound at the end of a word is can be spelt 'tion', 'sion', 'cian' or 'ssion'</p> <p>'cian' is often for <u>occupations</u> (jobs).</p> <p>'ssion' is often used if the <u>root word</u> ends in 'ss', 'mit' or 'cede' / 'ceed'.</p>	politician	electrician	magician
Week 2	<p>ing' suffix</p> <p>Double the consonant to protect lonely vowels! Trap = trapping</p> <p>If there are two consonants, the vowel is safe! E.g. sleep = sleeping</p> <p>Root words ending in 'e' are TRICK-E!</p> <p>Delete the 'e' and put 'ing'. E.g. bake = baking</p>	tripping	slipping	biting
Week 3	<p>sure / ture</p> <p>The 'chu' and 'zju' sounds at the end of a word are usually spelt 'ture' or 'sure'.</p> <p>To see which spelling you need, say the ending in a POSH VOICE!</p> <p>e.g. adventure</p> <p>e.g. treasure</p>	closure	measure	departure
Week 4	<p>sion / tion</p> <p>The 'shun' sound at the end of a word is often spelt 'tion' and the 'zhun' sound is usually spelt 'sion'.</p> <p>e.g. vision</p> <p>If it ends in 'shun', shoot the ti – on!</p>	position	condition	revision
Week 5	<p>-ous, -ious</p> <p>Where 'ous' is added to a <u>root word</u>, normal rules for adding vowel suffixes apply</p> <p>E.g. 'e' at the end of a root word is often removed. Fame = famous</p> <p>The 'ee' sound before 'ous' is often spelt 'i'. glorious</p>	numerous	serious	tremendous
